- 2. participate in discussions explaining the various experiences and how they are relevant to diversity and culture
- 3. exhibit behavior and etiquette that demonstrates cultural sensitivity and respect
- 4. identify challenges various groups experience in diverse cultures
- 5. explain various ways people have worked to overcome the challenges they have experienced in diverse cultures
- 6. explain what resources are available in the area to help people overcome the challenges they have experienced and how they can help
- 7. identify how diversity has had an impact on the student's own life

You will need to verify attendance of the six hours of diversity experiences, lectures, or events.

The following information explains how you **earn** your grade in this class. It will be changed if deemed necessary by the instructor and you will be notified immediately of any changes. If at any time you have questions about your grade or the grading procedure, it is important you talk to me about it. Others may provide you with inaccurate information. Grades are based on the following information.

1A – The Annual Diversity Conference will be done virtually this year. There are a total of three speakers that will present for the conference.

The dates and times are as follows:

09/24/2020 Liz Nead will speak 12:00pm-1:00pm 10/23/2020 Christian Picciolini will speak 12:00pm-1:30pm 11/7/2020 Kevin Gannon will speak 12:00pm-1:00pm

You will need to attend all three, in order to get points for attending the Diversity Conference. You will need to participate in three different Discussions on My Hills that will be over the three speakers. When posting your discussions, you will utilize the following criteria. (50 points each)

- Demonstrate cultural sensitivity and respect with all of your posts.
- Identify the title of the session in your Discussion post.
- Write Discussions at a college level using appropriate grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
- Your Discussion posts needs to be at least 150 words each.
- You will have to post your discussion before reading others

Discussion 1 – Explain how the speaker was related to diversity and culture.

Discussion 2 – Explain challenges that a certain group or various groups has/have experienced from one speaker.

Discussion 3 – From the speaker explain the variety of methods people from diverse groups have used to help overcome the differences they have experienced in diverse cultures.

You also need to provide verification of attendance at the conference. You can send a copy of the certificate as an attachment to the e-mail address on this syllabus. (40 points)

1B – If you are unable to attend the Diversity Conference virtually you will need to contact me prior to September 20th if at all possible, but definitely by September 21st, so we can arrange alternate diversity experiences for you in order to complete the course. You will still complete

the syllabus requirements, but your information will be from the diversity experiences you complete, rather than the Diversity Conference.

2 - Respond to at least two other individuals' Discussions. When responding you will use the following criteria. (10 points each)

- Demonstrate cultural sensitivity and respect with all of your posts.
- Comment on how this relates to what you experienced if you attended the same speaker or share your reaction to new information you learned from their post. When commenting on others' opinions do so respectfully.
- Responses need to be at least 50 words each.
- Write the responses at a college level using appropriate grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
- Also, respond to any questions others may have written about your post or to you.

3 – Student Club Paper

Studies show that involved students are successful students. Joining a student organization is a great wat to get involved on campus. Find the list of student organizations at Indian Hills by entering "Student Clubs" into the IHCC website's search bar. This is a quick way to find all sorts of information about the college.

Choose a club that interest you, either for personal or professional development. Then, do a little research on this club and answer the questions below. You may want to contact the club's advisor for more information. (100 Points)

- Which club did you choose?
- What is the purpose of this club?
- When does this club meet?
- Do a little research. Does this club have an online or social media presence, on Facebook for example? What did you learn?
- What kinds of activities does this club do?
- What are the benefits of belonging to this club?

This paper needs to be 500 words or more

4- Reflection Meeting

You will set up a time with the course instructor to meet over zoom to discussion what information you gained from one of the speakers. Below are the questions we will cover in the meeting. This meeting will take 30-45mins. You can set up this meeting any time after 10/1/2020.

- What information did you gain from one out of the three speakers: Liz Nead, Christian Picciolini, and Kevin Gannon.
- What is something that you learned from this course?
- Tell me what information you gained from the Student Club assignment?
- Are you part of any Clubs located on campus?
- What are your thoughts on Diversity?

- **5 Submit a final reflection and reaction paper to turnitin.com** by 11:59 PM on November 18th. Include your reaction to the Annual Diversity Conference. Include the information you learned about the various diverse groups, the challenges these groups may face, and how they work to overcome them. Also, include a section explaining how diversity has had an impact on your life. You can include information from any of your other assignments, but avoid writing the same thing you did before. You can also include information you learned from reading others' Discussions or posts, but avoid plagiarizing their work. You will need to follow these requirements. Only your instructor will read this paper. (100 points)
- Submit the paper to turnitin.com. The instructions are in Learning Units.
- Write it at a college level and include an introduction with a thesis, body, and conclusion in your paper.
- Be sure to avoid plagiarism and document any sources using MLA or APA.
- The paper needs to be at least 1000 words long.

Be sure to follow the scheduled **due dates**. Late work will be counted as a zero, unless there are extreme circumstances. Others are unable to comment on your posts if you neglect to do them.
